It aims to make education more inclusive, equitable and accessible to all with special emphasis on marginalized communities. This goal is reached by the universalization of education.

There are various revisions to the former education policy with the goal of improving education quality and enabling children to have a good education. To mention a few Principles of the New Policy.....Determine and nurture each child's potential. Providing flexible learning opportunities. Spend money on public education. Improve education quality.

Do excellent research, teach good governance and empower children. Improve children's creativity and logical thinking.

There are major reforms in the policy and the implementation will take time, but we must observe that this is the biggest policy decision in the Indian education system in a long time and long overdue. The policy, if implemented well, will definitely bring a great transformation in Indian education. I should definitely mention the Teachers' Role in the reforms ... .Teachers play a pivotal role in driving educational reforms, as they are responsible for implementing interventions, innovations, and policies. As they shape the minds of the next generation, the transformation of our education system depends on the skills and qualities of our educators.

It is essential to create a focused action plan for teachers at every level. NEP emphasizes on the quality of teacher education...Are our teachers prepared to teach our students the skills of the 21st century? Quality teacher education should be our priority to enable and empower our teachers to empower our students.

To conclude, teachers, let us do our best to upgrade ourselves and make the policy a success by raising the education standard. The policy is vast, it is good to go through the National Policy/ Framework and understand the same. Schools have started orientations

## REPORT OF THE 49TH NATIONAL SEMINAR

# 15TH MAY - 19TH MAY 2023 DHYANAVANA ASHRAM, MYSORE

## 15th May 2023

The participants gathered in the conference hall at 6.00 pm. Fr. Sydney, the National Chaplain, began the Seminar with a prayer. This was the first time we didn't have Fr. Herve Morissette in our midst. He was missed a lot by all present at the seminar. At 6.10 we prayed the rosary, followed by the Eucharistic Celebration at 6.30 pm.

Delmira Fernandes welcomed Mrs the gathering. The National coordinator Jacinta Pereira gave the introduction. Messages from Suzanne Cahen of Dialogue Cooperation, Asian Coordinator and Rosalinda Francia and Mrs Natty Dsouza were read out by NC Jacinta Pereira. The participants were asked to be punctual for the sessions and activities.

A minute's silence was maintained in memory of late Rev. Fr. Herve Morissette our International Chaplain and mentor, late Maria Thomas and Late Livia Quadros, senior TT members and late John Jerome Melod, former national treasurer.

A brief introduction of the origin, aims and purpose of the TT movement was given especially for the knowledge of the new participants. The participants introduced themselves.

## 16th May 2023

The day started with the Eucharistic celebration at 7.30 am. Karaikal, Kottar and Kerala teams were in charge of the liturgy. At 9.00 am we had the adoration of the blessed sacrament led by Fr. Sydney.

Each region participated in the adoration in their respective language.Fr. Sudhir gave a talk on the importance of truth in our lives.

At 11.40 am Fr. Sydney took a session on group dynamics. He conducted several activities to show us ways of teaching and learning in groups.

These activities helped us realise that students may have a lot of problems. We as teachers should help them find the solutions. Communication should be clear and proper. Children should be able to trust their teachers. The lives of children entrusted to the teachers should be handled with care. We should not damage the confidence of the child.



At 3.00pm - The activity reports of Andhra Pradesh, Bangalore, North and South Goa, Karaikal, Kerala and Kottar regions were read. The National coordinator Mrs Jacinta Pereira explained what the TT is meant for - The Vision and Mission of teachers team.

After listening to the reports, Fr. Sydney read out the mission and vision statement and said that our focus should be on education imparting the Christian values. Other activities in collaboration with the church can be done separately but we need to strive in the field of education. We can visit the prison, orphanage and old age homes. These should be educational and not just give food and donations. Jacinta clarified that senior teachers are welcome but teachers in service are called so that they benefit from the topics discussed in the seminar and use it in their school.

At 7:30 p.m. we concluded with the Rosary



#### 17th May 2023

The Eucharistic celebration was at 7:30 a.m. The liturgy was done by Goa region. At 9:00 a.m. the resource person Rev. Fr Rohan D Almeida S J arrived.

A brief introduction was given by the National coordinator Mrs Jacinta Pereira followed by the lighting of the lamp where Fr. Rohan, Fr. Sydney, Mrs Jacinta Pereira and our senior members Mrs Justina Rodrigues and Mrs Adilakshmi were invited to light the lamp.

Fr Rohan started his session on the topic of PARADIGM SHIFT IN THE FIELD OF EDUCATION.



He said nowadays Education has become very much commercialised, and asked the teachers to reflect on the question, "What is my understanding of knowledge?" A video on the important landmarks of our ancient education was shown.

Another question posed to the teachers for reflection was - "As teachers, what are the challenges we face as we move to a new paradigm shift in the field of Education"? He said, we will have to adapt to the new methods of teaching and learning, more involvement by the students and less talking by the teacher. Lecture method is out, stress is on activity based, skill based, learning by doing methods. He further added that the rich heritage of ancient Indian knowledge has been a guiding light for the policy.

The aim of education in ancient India was not just the acquisition of knowledge as preparation for life in this world but for a life beyond schooling, for the complete realisation and liberation of the self. The highest education is that which does not merely give us information but makes our life in harmony with existence.

Fr. Rohan explained to the teachers how the NEP throws a challenge to the teachers with its paradigm shift in Education. He also explained how we plan to meet this paradigm shift. Conduct in depth and extensive teacher provide resource materials training. students and teachers, restructure the learning environment and update the curriculum. He also added that we as teachers have a great task and responsibility now with the new paradigm shift in the field of education.



In the evening NC Jacinta Pereira asked the teachers as to who would be willing to continue Fr. Morissette's work of Interlink, a monthly bulletin of Teachers' teams.

Mary Fernandes, a TT member from Goa, volunteered to help Fr. Sydney in compiling the articles for the Interlink. Members were asked to contribute articles for the Interlink. Father also asked the members to volunteer to prepare questionnaires as Fr. Morissette did for each month. Many members accepted the task.



Next year being the fiftieth year of our National Seminar, all RA's were requested to think of how to celebrate fifty years of National Seminar in 2024.

At 7:00 p.m. we prayed the Rosary followed by dinner. Later we had a fun-time with songs, skits and dancing.

### 18th May 2023

Eucharistic celebration at 7.30 am. Liturgy was arranged by Andhra Region.

At 9.00 am Session continued with Fr. Rohan Almeida. He spoke on the "Aims of Education for the National Curriculum Framework (NCF)".

He said that it aims for a society with individuals who are healthy, knowledgeable and with capacities and values dispositions to participate effectively and meaningfully in a democracy. The NCF for school education is development based on the vision of the NEP 2020. The NCF addresses education for the age group of 3 to 18 years across the entire range of diverse institutions in India.

He also made the teachers aware of the importance of physical education, Education, Environmental Education and Vocational Education.

He also threw light on the Key principles of good Assessment, and that the NEP will overhaul the education system in India and make teaching and learning vibrant, easier and joyful.

At 6.00 pm the regions were asked to get into groups and plan for the year June 2023 - 24 and submit region wise reports to the National secretary.

The National Coordinator Mrs. Jacinta Pereira presented the accounts of the Souvenir released in 2022 to felicitate Fr. Herve Morissette.

A purse was passed around to collect donations for the TT Corpus fund.

The budget was presented by the National treasurer Mrs. Delmira Fernandes.

### 19th May 2023

Eucharistic celebration was at 7.30 am. Liturgy was arranged by the Bangalore team. After breakfast everyone was free to go sightseeing around Mysore.

With this the 49th TT seminar came to an end.

The seminar focused on the important changes that happen in the field of education, mainly the paradigm shift, i.e., When the usual way of thinking about or doing something is replaced by a new and different way.

The seminar was conducted by Rev. Fr. Rohan Almeida. There were teachers from different regions who attended the seminar, like North and South Goa ,Bangalore, Andhra Pradesh ,Tamil Nadu, Kerala, and so on. This seminar was a very good experience for us.

We had group activities ,brainstorming games, Ice breaking sessions by Fr. Sydney. We got the opportunity to discuss with the teachers of other regions, the various activities they have been doing since this team has been instituted. The session by Fr. Rohan D'Almeida, on Paradigm Shift in the Field of Education was very useful for us. He explained the main objective of NEP 2020, is to promote holistic experiential, discussion – based, and analysis – based learning. In addition, the NEP 2020 focuses on reducing the curriculum content to make space for critical thinking and in turn, develop individuals with skills instilled in them. He also added that NEP 2020 aims to replace the present 10+2 system with the latest 5+3+3+4. Curricular structure corresponding to ages 3-8, 8-11, 11-14 and 14-18 years. The main motto of NEP is – Equitable and Inclusive Education.

There was active participation from all teachers. Small group discussions were organised which enabled the teachers to improve their knowledge and understanding of the topic by engaging with the key issues. Within a short time Trs. did their best, as the resource person was very much impressed. He said a Teacher's effectiveness lies in understanding the motivation of the learner. I felt Fr. Rohan is an expert in his field. He has delivered in the right way, it was very meaningful and a need of the hour. The outputs by the resource person as well as the sharing from the participation have surely enriched the members of the TT to take up in the classroom and bear abundant fruits.
